The events of this play occur in 1955, and contain scenes depicting smoking, alcohol abuse, and some moments of verbal or physical domestic abuse.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE:

Stating the obvious... Cat on a Hot Tin Roof is one of the greatest plays ever written by one of the greatest playwrights who ever lived.

Through its original broadway staging in 1955, an Oscar-nominated film starring a pair of Hollywood icons, as well as several stage and television revivals, *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof* challenged audiences to confront complex relationships within a traditional family from the fading antebellum south. As only great art can, it also caused audiences to turn the mirror on themselves.

Cat's themes cover a wide gamut of human conditions—intimacy and loneliness; wealth and influence; addiction and mortality; denial and resentment.

Cat is a classic to be sure. However, it endures not just because of what it says about it's time but because of its continuing relevance to our time. While the play gives us a window into a dysfunctional family who squabbles over money, property, legacy and power, it is not this dysfunction that makes Cat so intriguing. Sexism, terminal cancer, addiction, depression and homosexuality are no longer the hush subjects they were when Cat first premiered almost 70 years ago.

So why does Williams' classic tale <u>still</u> strike a chord? Its timeless appeal, in the view of this director at least, is its ability to illuminate our ever-present, very human temptation to believe we can control the events and people around us.

The characters of *Cat* conspire, cajole, and contort facts in a desperate attempt to control the will and actions of fellow family members, romantic desires, financial decisions, alcoholism, and even death itself. As we soon see, their efforts fall well short of the desired effect.

Cat endures because it reminds us of an uncomfortable yet unavoidable truth—control is the ultimate illusion.

Austin Barrick (Sound Designer)

Sean Young (Director) - Cat marks Sean's 30th Anniversary at EPAC. Since 1994's The Secret Garden, he's appeared in more than two dozen main stage productions, including Sweeney Todd, Assassins (twice), Ragtime, Evita, Sunday in the Park with George (also twice) and last season's production of The Prom. He has also performed at the Fulton Theater (Cinderella), The American Music Theater (Branson to Broadway) and the Hershey Theater with the Hershey Symphony (Jesus Christ Superstar in Concert). Sean's directing credits include the EPAC productions of Jesus Christ Superstar in 2008, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat and the 9/11 tribute play, The Guys. His next directorial effort will be a staging of Aaron Sorkin's A Few Good Men this October at Lebanon Community Theatre. EPAC ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Edward R. Fernandez (Artistic Director) - This is Ed's 28th year as Artistic Director of the Ephrata Performing Arts Center. A native of New York City, Ed studied theatre arts at the Leonard Davies Center for the Performing Arts at the City College of New York, as well as Acting and Scene Study with the renowned acting teacher and theorist Herbert Berghof at his studio in Manhattan. In 1987, he came to Lancaster to perform in the EPAC (Ephrata Performing Arts Center) production of *The Mousetrap*, fell in love with EPAC, and decided to move to Lancaster County.

After two years of acting in the Lancaster and Berks County area, Ed was asked to perform the leading role in Edward Albee's *The Man Who Had Three Arms* at the Albee Festival at Albright College. The production was moved to the Edinburgh Fringe Festival (Scotland), where it took the First Fringe Award. Upon returning to Lancaster County, Ed directed his first show at EPAC, *Golddust*, and a western musical based on Moliere's *The Miser*. After the opening of *Golddust*, Ed went on to become one of the most prolific directors of musical theatre in the Lancaster Area. In 1996, Ed took over the reins as Artistic Director at the Ephrata Performing Arts Center.

His EPAC directing credits are too numerous to mention, besides producing all the productions over his 28 years as Artistic Director, he has directed most of them. In addition, he has directed Pacific Overtures, Macbeth and Oedipus Rex for Theatre of the Seventh Sister, Cinderella, Pippin, Wizard of Oz, Man of La Mancha, Fiddler on the Roof and Peter Pan for the Fulton Opera House, and Bus Stop and Dancing at Lungasha for the York Little Theatre, now known as The Belmont. Ed's commitment to theatre education is reflected in the classes he has taught, including Basic Acting Technique, Advanced Scene, Monologue workshops, and Musical Theatre Technique.

Ed has seen the Ephrata Performing Arts Center grow incredibly over the 35-plus years that he has been here, from a small hot barn to the beautiful year-round facility you are sitting in tonight. It was a long hard road but a wonderful, fun one as well, filled with laughter, love, creativity, and great memories.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Tennessee Williams • (1911-1983) was one of America's most prolific and important playwrights. His prodigious output included The Glass Menagerie (NY Drama Critics Award 1944), A Streetcar Named Desire (New York Drama Critics Award, Pulitzer Prize 1947), Summer and Smoke (1948), The Rose Tattoo (1951), Camino Real (1953), Cat on a Hot Tin Roof (New York Drama Critics Award, Pulitzer Prize 1955), Orpheus Descending (1957), Sweet Bird of Youth (1959), Night of the Iguana (1961), The Milk Train Doesn't Stop Here Anymore (1963), Out Cry (1973), Vieux Carre (1977), A Lovely Sunday for Creve Coeur (1979), and Something Cloudy, Something Clear (1981).



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
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
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
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
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
